

The Landscape In Niles Ohio Is Constantly Changing

Through the years, since the first resident of the village decided to settle near the banks of the Mosquito Creek, till today, it is hard to imagine this area all covered in trees and only a simple pathway leading to the next homestead.

The hardships our pioneer settlers had to endure are impossible for us to begin to comprehend. It is even hard for some people to imagine what happened to the "doughnut" in town and it wasn't that long ago it disappeared. For the younger generation, lost forever, is the "hometown" atmosphere of walking the streets to town for a movie, meeting friends and just visiting with your neighbors, and always having an ice cream cone at Isaly's before walking home.

The Historical Society tries to keep the memories alive by exposing you to the many colorful stories and views of the "yesterdays" in Niles. This month we will show you pictures of some of the changes that have taken place through out the years.

Do you remember when Church Street crossed over State Street and made a curve down the hill to the east and ended up connecting with Robbins Avenue? Back in the 1930's the north end of State Street ended at Church Street.



You can clearly see the McKinley Memorial Building(A) in the upper left of the picture. Just to the right of it, is "Church Street"(B) and it goes straight down to the lower right side of the picture. The lower center part of the aerial view clearly shows the Central Park with the fountain(C) in the center, just to the left of Church Street. The band stand(D)was located on the northeast side of the fountain. On the other side of Church Street was a small railroad freight station, and the B&O tracks.(E)



Bringing you up to the present time, the Central Park Apartment building is now located in the general location of where the fountain and band stand was located. Now, State Street extends out to Robbins Avenue and the new bike trail comfort station is being built on the north side of what was Church Street where the railroad station was located.



Why was this change made? Well, there was a real danger of the railroads crossing over Robbins Avenue. 17 people were killed at those tracks and it became apparent that changes had to be made. The tracks needed to go over Robbins Avenue. State street was extended to Robbins Avenue and Robbins Avenue would dead end into Main Street in the separation project. Editor's note—This construction took place in 1953 and also included the underpasses for North Main Street and a new bridge crossing Mosqito Creek on Robbins Ave.

This pictures shows the area where the B& O station once stood and now it will be the new home of the bike trail comfort station. The bike trail will eventually extend from Ashtabula south to the Mill Creek Metropark Bike Path in Canfield, Ohio, then on south to the Columbiana County border. Parts of the trail are completed now and being used.

Both Niles and Warren portions of the Greenway primarily are being paid through Federal grants. Niles will have a 4 ½ mile stretch to be completed this year.

identify and has told me that if you have something at home, and you don't know what it is, bring it along, see if you can get some answers.



It has been a long time since we had a home town "bakery" in town. Many of our members would remember the *Kaiser's Pastry Shop* at 5 East State Street in the late 50's and 60's. There was also the *Magic Oven* on North Main Street some time ago.

Now we have the "Blue Iris". It is located at 606 Robbins Avenue, in that little strip of stores where *Tunison*, *Cornicelli Cleaners*, *Niles Printing*, and *Progressive Camera Shop* were all located at one time.

Melissa Yohman attended Mount Carmel school and



graduated from Niles High School in 1987. She was trained in floral arts and later went to **La Cordon Bleu** in Pittsburgh where she received her degree in Pastry Arts. She met her husband, *Steve Murphy* there, who is a graduate of the same school.

They have moved back to Niles and bake an assortment of 70 flavors of cupcakes and cinnamon rolls. They also take orders for cakes that are a delicious one-of- a-kind design. There

are no preservatives used and they use European Butter and fine imported Chocolate. Everything is fresh, baked daily and any leftovers are donated to a church group who tend to the needy. They also work with the TCTC with Niles students.

It's great to have a new business in town and we are glad to have Melissa and her husband, Steve back home again. Stop by and see them, you'll be glad you did..

It bothered Sue to no end, that President McKinley's grandmothers' stone was in such a deplorable state at the Niles Cemetery. She

worked in her quiet manner getting all the details in line. She contacted *Diane Corbin* from the Warren Marble Company and they worked together, getting a "rubbing" from the old stone, so the new stone would look as close to the old one as possible. With all the attention to this project, an anonymous donor paid for the cost of the stone and installation. Needless to say, Sue was delighted, but it was because of her persistence and the blessed donor that, President McKinley's grandmother, *Anne Allison*, now has a new stone.

Sue served as a docent at the museum frequently and was always more than willing to help out where ever needed. In December, Sue Larson had accepted the nomination for Vice-President of the Niles Historical Society and would have been elected on January 8, 2011. However she died in her sleep just a week earlier.

She was a wonderful, sincere person, and is greatly missed..
